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Hi, it's Ross Jeffries. Welcome to the Beyond Dating Tips/Advice for Men Mastery Series about how to meet women anytime and anywhere. This is Video 10 of 10, "Use Implied Compliments and Triple Your Pick-Up Success." I really like implied compliments. It's quite an interesting concept, and you're going to use it very powerfully, so let's get going.

Why would we want to use implied compliments? Direct compliments can often be resisted, even if you mean them. Here's why.

- 1. She may not believe that what you're saying is true about herself.
- 2. She might have heard it so many times before that even if she believes it, it has lost its impact.
- 3. She may suspect that you don't really mean it and that you're just saying it to try to get in her pants.
- 4. She may not think you know her well enough to be saying it. She may believe it's true about herself and that you're being sincere, but for whatever reason, she doesn't believe you've earned the right to tell her that. You don't know her well enough.

Implied compliments are really powerful because they slip around past all of this stuff. Implying things slips past resistance. This is sort of a subtle point, but I think you can understand as you listen to me exactly what it means.

When we imply something, the listener has to use an active process of interpreting what we mean. That active process of putting together one plus one equals two feels exactly like the process they use when they have their own self-originated thinking. When the woman interprets what we're implying, she feels like it's her own thought. Because it's her own thought, she doesn't resist it.

Let me show you how this works. Implied compliments work really well with three magic words. Those magic words are "It's just that." If I could give you some advice,

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and that's what I'm doing, I would advise you to start all your implied compliments with that phrase.

Here's an example. "It's just that I really like women with class and style, so I had to say hello. My name is Dick." What are we implying but not stating directly? We're implying that we think she has class and style. Why else would we be talking to her?

You're not saying, "I think you have class and style. I wanted to come up and talk to you." You say, "It's just that I really like women with class and style, so I had to say hello." Since she's a woman and you're saying hello to her, the implication is that you think she has class and style.

Indeed, that's what goes on in her head. Her train of thought isn't, "Oh, he's hitting on me." She's thinking, "He likes women with class and style. He must think that way about me. He thinks I have class and style," not, "He's trying to convince me I have class and style." It's amazing how you can break right through even the most hardened woman's resistance by using these implied compliments.

You could say, "I couldn't help noticing how much I like your class and style, so I had to say hello." That's a direct opener with a compliment. We've dealt with direct openers, and that's actually really good.

There's absolutely nothing wrong with that, but you may not be comfortable being that direct. Being indirect is a way for you to handle your own comfort levels, but also remember that some women just find that implying something to them seems more clever and witty.

Setting aside the resistance issue, some women like it when you're giving an implied compliment because it comes across as you being wittier. Again, it would be perfectly suitable for you to come up and say, "I couldn't help noticing how much I like your class and style. I had to say hello before I go on about my day." Remember to throw in the time constraint if you're going to be direct.

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Here's the implied compliment formula. "It's just that I really like," or admire "women with X and Y, so I had to say hello." X is a characteristic you like, like class. Y is another characteristic you like. That's the formula. You can fill in the blanks with what you like.
